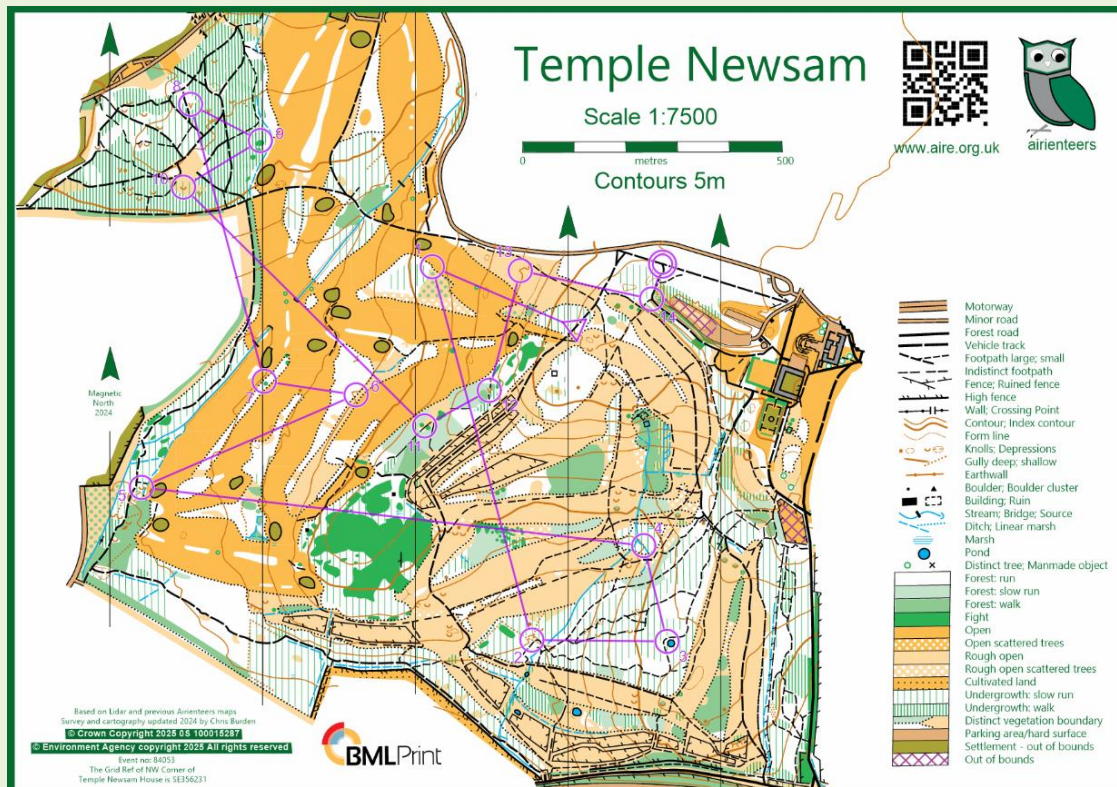

This year we had an impressive team entry of 59 runners and I hoped that with the advantage of home terrain we just might be able to surprise SYO. But they were in no way complacent and they put in an astonishing entry of 84 runners to secure the win! A big thank you from me to everybody who signed up and many thanks also to the club for subsidising entry fees for the team. If any adult non-helper entrants have not yet paid their £5 please can they now do so.

Everybody seemed to agree it was a really well organised event with a good atmosphere at the event centre despite the damp and windy weather. ## Long-overdue return to orienteering – Carole Paley

At the time of writing, I am experiencing a sense of satisfaction having completed my first orienteering event in many years. The last time I participated in an event, I was classified as W35; yesterday's event saw me compete as W65!

The extended absence from orienteering can be attributed to marriage and the subsequent birth of three children in rapid succession (within less than three years), which left me too busy to manage more than occasional runs from our home in Embsay, near Skipton. When I resumed competitive running, it was primarily in 5-10K events and the occasional half marathon. Although orienteering had crossed my mind, advancing age brought with it the need for reading glasses to decipher maps clearly, and the prospect of running with a visor or glasses around my neck was unappealing. To make matters more complicated, over the years, several foot surgeries resulted in the loss of three toes, followed by a hip replacement in 2023. Nonetheless, I continued running with assistance from my wonderful podiatrist who makes custom orthotics for my shoes.

The impetus to re-engage in orienteering emerged in late 2023 when my colleagues at the University of Leeds discussed having an active social activity in the spring of 2024. I offered to design an orienteering course around the university grounds, envisioning that a score event would be entertaining and would provide an interesting tour of the historic campus. This prompted me to take the plunge and do a local event and rekindled my interest in orienteering, encouraging me to rejoin AIRE after a 30+ year absence. I should also mention that I had recently acquired multi-focal contact lenses, enabling me to read maps without glasses, which was another big plus.



So this weekend saw me at the start line of a freezing PFO local event, equipped with a shiny new 'dibber' and compass. I had decided to take it relatively easy and chose a light green course, just to get back into the swing of things. Initially, it took a couple of controls to find my feet, but after that, aside from becoming hopelessly entangled in brambles at one point, I was pleasantly surprised by how quickly everything fell back into place. What began as a tentative experiment ended up as a thoroughly enjoyable event, culminating in third place overall and first place in the W65 category, much to my astonishment.

I am now actively seeking another local event where I will probably bite the bullet and attempt a green course. Adapting to 'dibbing,' which was in its infancy when I last competed, is still a learning curve, however, I found the event officials really helpful and supportive, welcoming me back to the orienteering 'family'. I look forward to meeting other AIRE members at future events and hopefully rekindling one or two old friendships!

## Why not Settle for a MapRun? – Richard Wilson

AIRE's geographical "territory" is ill-defined, but massive, encompassing a large slice of the Yorkshire Dales National Park, in which it has sadly few members.

So opportunities to orienteer in the wonderful Dales terrain are understandably limited. Organising, planning, and even competing, have reduced appeal when reaching the venue demands driving for an hour or more, and we are lucky to have members willing to put on our Dales Trophy and Town & Country weekends. But if you can't wait for the next of those, and fancy an O challenge amidst Dales scenery, Settle Harriers have just what you need!

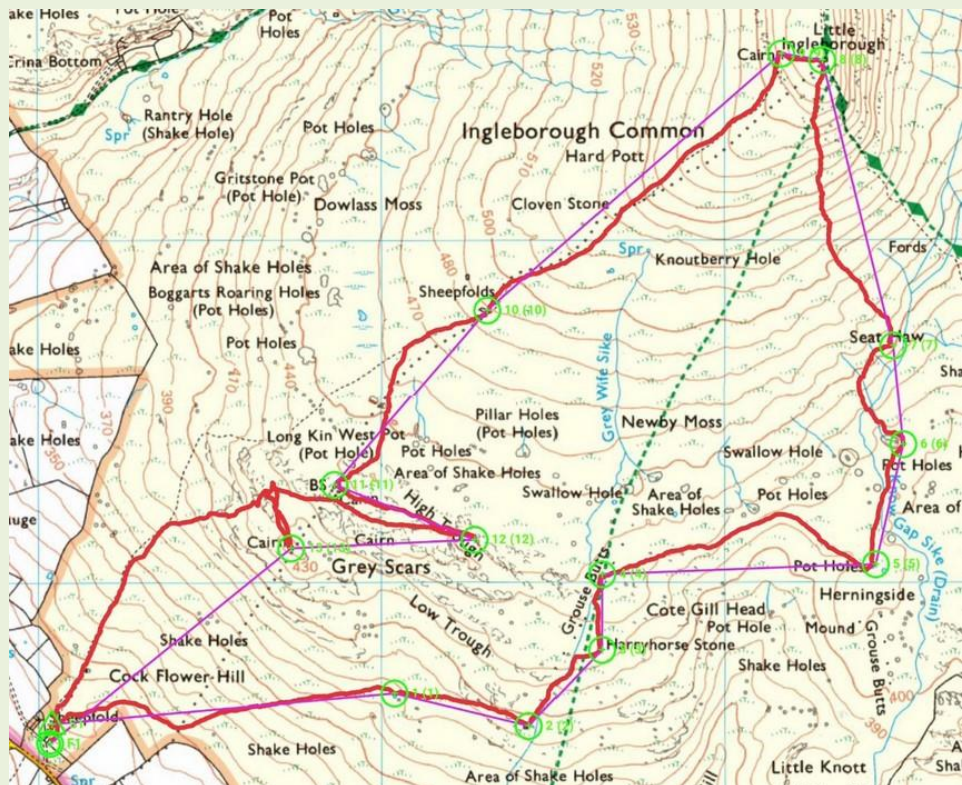
Many of us discovered MapRun during Covid. Some of us even thought it was The Future; why bother with all the faff of organising, car parks, and permissions when we can orienteer when we please?

I'd found the Dales MapRun courses by searching on the MapRun app itself. At the time, I didn't know who'd set up the courses, and hadn't joined the Harriers, though I suspected they were the culprits. As a fellrunner, I'm aware of a general perception that fellrunners are not great navigators; maps and compasses are rarely seen at fell races except at kit checks. So would Harriers MapRuns be too easy-peasy?

Recently I decided to try one, as a way of brushing up on using the app, in preparation for a MapRun event near Keswick. The start and finish were at the top of the old road between Clapham and Ingleton, above Cold Cotes, and the terrain was wall-free fell below Ingleborough. The map provided

in the app was the OS Explorer, so I printed the same from MemoryMap, and plotted the controls onto it. Some of the rings had nothing in the middle of them, and there were no control descriptions .....

The course was hard, both physically and technically - excellent orienteering.





Especially the “mystery” controls, of which #7 proved to be a 2-foot tall unmapped boundary stone amidst 3-foot rushes; I’d never have found it without cheating! (MemoryMap) The next three legs were clearly planned with fellrunners in mind, as they involved a long and rough climb to the cairn on Little Ingleborough, and a boggy run down the Cold Cotes path, before more technical stuff during which, whilst messing up #13, I eventually spotted it (a cairn) from some distance away, accidentally dropped my map (frozen fingers) and then had to resort to cheating again to retrace my steps and find it.



Having also recently joined Settle Harriers, I asked chairman, Simon Oxley - a former member of South Ribble OC - what he knew about the Dales MapRun courses, and it turned out that it was he who had set them up, during Covid. I also learned that I had overlooked a [page on the club website](#) with links to printable maps and control descriptions!

Not all the courses will appeal to orienteers looking for “technical”. Top of my to-do list is Crina Bottom, near Ingleton. Start/finish is a mile from the nearest road; 7.5k course; Explorer map; complex, wall-free limestone terrain. Control 8 demands 190m of gratuitous climb (to keep Harriers happy!) followed immediately by 170m back down to 9, but can be missed out if you aren’t bothered about a Dsq.

Recommended entertainment for your next eventless weekend!

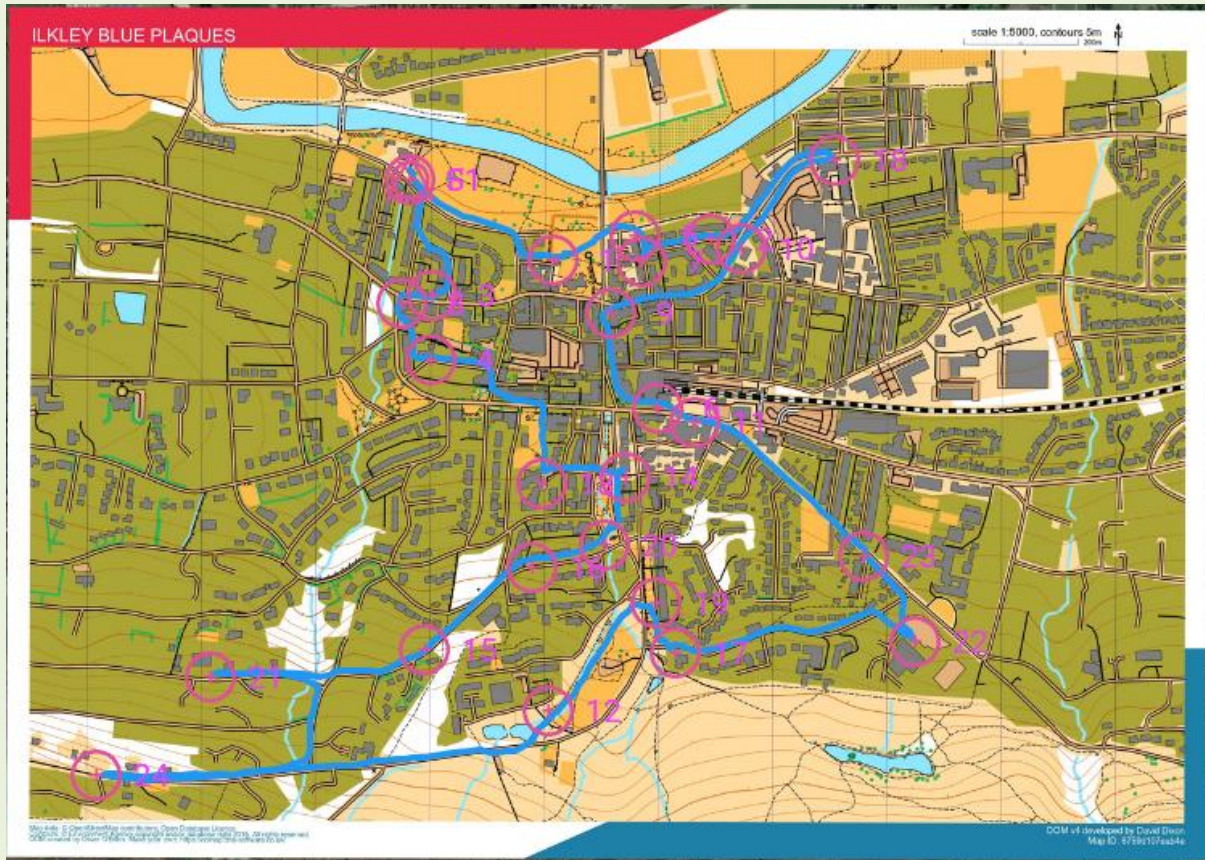




## Ilkley Blue Plaques – New Year’s Day

Our New Year’s Day event was a very enjoyable Maprun event around the Blue Plaques of Ilkley, 24 in all.

This is Steve Webb’s route, the shortest recorded (David Alcock, Henry Stitson and Anne Murgatroyd took very similar routes).

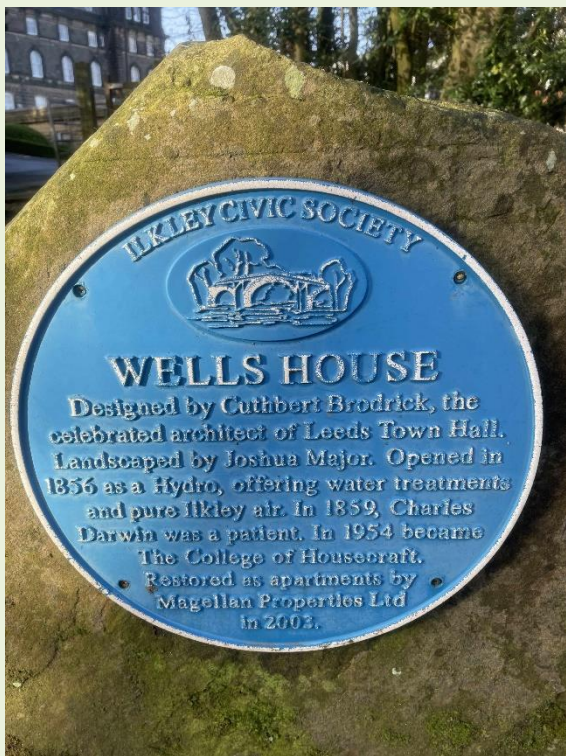


Of course, most of us were going much too fast to read plaques as we were going round (!), so I’ve looked some up and been back to take some pictures.

For example –

- 20 is Heath House, where the creator of Postman Pat lived
- 17 is Hillside, where Charles Darwin stayed while having hydropathic treatment at Wells House Hydro (12 – on the other side of what is now Darwin Gardens), and also has a blue plaque commemorating Daphne Steele, a pioneering nurse and midwife originally from Guyana who worked and lived there
- 23 (which looked to me like an unremarkable house just off Cowpasture Road) is Loxleigh, which was used as a hostel for Jewish children escaping from Nazi Europe at the end of the 1930s.
