


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Cover: Peter Haines bringing home our MW70 team to a win at the British Relay Championships



Stars of the show were the M/W70 team of Spectacled bAIREs. AIRE were defending champions in this class and had also won the trophy in 2023, so we were aiming for a hat trick. Tony Carlyle and Susan Stevens ran in both of those victorious teams, and after the first two legs this year



they had got the team into 3rd place overall. With a 3 minute gap to the leader it looked as though if we were to retain the trophy we would need a British M70 champion running on the anchor leg. Fortunately that is just what we had; step forward Peter Haines who duly crossed the line a minute ahead of Happy Herts to ensure the trophy stays in West Yorkshire for another year!

A big well done to the Paddington bAIRE team of Charlie, Keir and Penny who stormed to a brilliant silver medal in the M/W12 class, following on from the silver medal at JK. It looked as though we also picked up the bronze medal with the Pudsey bAIRE team of Sebastian, Alfie and Joby but unfortunately there was a mispunch. But the younger Pudsey bAIREs chased Paddington all the way to the finish and came in only 6 seconds behind; it's great to have intra club competition like that.

There was another fantastic silver medal for Katie, Bethan and Alethea running this time in Junior Ad-Hoc. As W18, 16 and 14 they competed in W48- at the JK but at BRC the Junior Ad-Hoc was a better option with different length and technical difficulty across the three legs. They were only 20 seconds off winning gold and it was notable both the other medal winning teams had two boys in their line up.

It was great that we had an M18 team with M14 Samuel stepping up to run with Ewen and Henry. At BRC the main teams comprise three laps of equal length and difficulty whereas at JK the middle leg is shorter; nevertheless the Brown bAIREs had excellent runs and finished just 50 seconds away from a podium place.

As usual I was on the lookout for some strong individual results amid the team races: Ewen was first back from the mass start on leg 1 in M18, Mary and Bethan had the fastest times on leg 2 for Women's Short and Junior Ad-Hoc respectively, and Peter was fastest on leg 3 for M/W70.

Mixed Sprint Relays

At the moment we only have 2 people signed up for the Mixed Sprint Relays in August (Henry and David A), so we don't yet have a team. It's at an RAF base in Suffolk, so is a long way to travel, but can be combined with the British Sprint Championships at the University of East Anglia in Norwich the next day (likely to be a good venue).

Moughton & Sulber National Event, 21st September – Chris Burden

Moughton and Sulber is an exciting new, and very extensive limestone area, that we have been contemplating developing for some years. A lot of hard work by Anne and Richard Wilson on permissions, surveying and drawing the map, and co-planning the courses has brought the event to fruition. Steve Webb has been a great help liaising with Natural England. Andy Hobson has planned the longer courses.

It's Volunteer Team 1's turn to help at this event. We'll need a good turn out, as on the current estimate we will require at least 31 volunteers.

We have one peculiar task, more akin to marshalling on a fell race than the normal orienteering volunteer role. We need a volunteer (or possibly two) at Sulber Gate to ensure everybody uses a disinfectant footbath to prevent the spread of a fungal disease. We also need to ensure that both adjacent gates remain closed. We'd also like to take a small first aid kit to this spot, for self-administering, unless we are fortunate enough to get a First Aider volunteer.

Natural England will be transporting the footbath so need to worry about that.

The situation for this posting is in the foreground of the photograph, affording an airy view of approaching orienteers. It is sheltered from prevailing winds, but high (380m) and exposed. The ideal is for one individual who hopefully has a very light weight competition tent to provide that cover. But it is possible we will be able to provide a tent if you do not have one. There are quite a few knocking around among club members.

We need cover from approximately 10.40 until approximately 13.30. The walk to Sulber Gate from Assembly, the closest available parking is 3.7k. If you want to run it is 1.8k to the Far Start and 2k to the Near Start and Finish. If we



can get 2 marshals and both intend to run it will be best for the 1st runner to delay downloading until after they have finished their shift.

We would be very grateful if you could contact Chris Burden, the event organiser as soon as possible if you would like to fulfil this role, as it is crucial to the event but unlikely to be the most popular of roles.

Similarly, the Far Start is at 350m and 2.7k from Assembly and 1.4k from the Finish. I am attempting to make the Starts as light weight and unbulky as possible, but for this event this really is one for younger volunteers to staff the Far Start, rather than the normally elderly crew, of whom I am one. (Please Regulars forgive me for this somewhat unflattering description!)

I am sure you will all love the new area, so when entries open in late July get those entries in, and be sure to volunteer if you are in Team 1, and hopefully we won't need to poach volunteers from other teams.

Last year, young Airienteers have been supported to attend JROS O-training camps at Lagganlia and Czechia, to compete at EYOC in Poland, WUOC in Bulgaria and, next up, Emily Gibbins in the 2025 Junior World Orienteering Championships (JWOC) in Italy 26 June to 4 July. The 38th edition of this classic 8.4km navigational fell race across Ilkley Moor saw 188 runners accept the challenge on a beautiful May evening.

2025 was a year for youth with both the Senior Men's and Women's races being won by runners in the U23 age class. First overall and winner of both the Men's Senior Jack Bloor trophy and the Arthur Dolphin Men's U23 trophy was Sam Bentham of Ilkley Harriers. At just 18yrs of age and with an impressive time of 38:31, Sam could well be a future challenge to Greg Hull's course record of 38:04 that has stood since 2007. Proving that experience counts, MV40 Graham Rush of Leeds City AC came second to also win the Bloor Family trophy for first man over-40. Ilkley Harrier Oli Murphy took 3rd place.

Charlotte Rawstron of Skyrac was 18th overall and winner of the Women's Senior Jack Bloor Trophy plus the Pat Bloor Women's U23 trophy in a time of 46:48. Wharfedale Harriers claimed both 2nd and 3rd positions through Molly Browne and Sophie Martin.

Representing North Leeds Fell Runners, Matt Calvert was 1st MV50. Bingley Harrier Steve Webb led the MV60 class and Keith Brewster of Valley Striders was 1st MV70.

In the women's veteran categories, Masako Kondo of Abbey Runners claimed the Mike Rose trophy winning the FV40 class, whilst Ilkley Harriers Jane McCarthy and Joyce Marshall took the FV50 and FV60 titles respectively.

Overall 1st, 2nd, and 3rd, male and female winners together with class winners each received one of the classic Jack Bloor 'small trophies'. Made by artist James Fonquernie, each year these unique trophies feature a different rock carving found on Ilkley Moor. The 2025 trophy illustrates the 'Mile Stone Rock.

In the team competitions, Jenny Roberts, Niamh Jackson and Ellis Maguire of North Leeds Fell Runners took top spot for the women. Ilkley Harriers were 2nd and Abbey Runners 3rd. Ilkley Harriers were the first men's team thanks to performances by Sam Bentham, Oli Murphy and Jack Cummings. Second place went to Leeds City AC and third to Pudsey & Bramley.

Earlier in the evening 80 enthusiastic youngsters tackled the Junior races. In the U9's race, Samuel Milner of Keighley & Craven shaved 34 seconds off his previous time to win in 3:48. Otley AC's May Wray-McCann was the leading girl just 5 seconds ahead of Lauren Martin from Wharfedale Harriers. Just three seconds separated the top three runners in the U11's race with Ronnie Brewer of Keighley & Craven coming out on top. First girl was Isobel Moore of Ilkley Harriers.

All the U13, U15 and U19 runners enjoy a single mass start then head up to Rocky Valley with the U19s climbing beyond to the Cairn. In the U13 class Robyn Cooper of Keighley & Craven took the girls' title whilst Bingley Harrier Benjamin O'Mahoney won the boy's race in a time of 8:05. Max Moody of Pudsey & Bramley was leading U15 boy whilst Otley AC's Lily Richards was first U15 girl. The 2.2km U19 race climbs 185m with splendid views over Wharfedale. Bethan Buckley of Keighley & Craven won the girls' race whilst Ilkley Harrier Joseph Bentham took the boy's title winning in 11:55.

The team from Outside The Box, Ilkley's renowned community café, did the juniors proud with each runner receiving a voucher and the leading girls and boys being presented with certificates and the ultimate in sustainable prizes – beautiful, edible, hand-crafted 'cookie medals'. Thank you OTB!

The Jack Bloor Race was established in 1985 to commemorate the life of an acclaimed Yorkshire sportsman. In addition to his own sporting accomplishments, Jack Bloor was renowned for encouraging young people to engage in outdoor sport. Along with donations and legacies, all monies raised from these annual races go to the Jack Bloor Fund that helps support young Yorkshire athletes to develop their physical and technical skills in any recognised outdoor adventure sport.

Applicants must be under-26, either from or based in Yorkshire and be a member of a Yorkshire sports club or a national sport governing body. Applications are welcome at any time. Further details can be found at www.jackbloor.co.uk



Junior World Orienteering Training Camp – Emily Gibbins

Prior to my trip to the official JWOC competition (Junior World Orienteering Championships) at the end of June, I managed to fit in a trip over a long weekend to attend the Pre-JWOC training camp in Italy. This training camp is designed to prepare you for what the races might look like, immersing you in forests and towns similar to those where the competition will take place.

JWOC this year is being held in the Trento region of Italy, a mountainous area in the southern Dolomites. The forests are steep and rocky, with courses often taking you well above 1000 metres. The towns and villages are equally challenging, with steep, twisty streets full of underpasses and alleyways, unlike anything in the UK.


I took part in two races, alongside as many training sessions as we could fit in around them. On the Saturday, I competed in a sprint in the medieval village of Mezzano. Although I made minimal navigational errors, the technical and complex nature of the village made it difficult to build up any real speed. I was constantly having to watch out for people coming around corners, carefully navigate uneven staircases, and stay focused despite being followed by several people filming. There was a lot going on.

Obviously the trip wasn't complete without copious amounts of ice cream, pizza and pasta! All of which was very much enjoyed!





For anyone relatively new to orienteering or who is interested in such things, all* finishers who are aged 16 or over get ranking points at all Regional, National or Major events**. Points are calculated by a top-secret algorithm which is securely held in a heavily guarded vault at British Orienteering HQ in Derbyshire***.

Your overall ranking is determined from the best 6 scores over the previous calendar year, and the list is updated every Wednesday night. Rankings can be filtered in various ways, by Forest (ie: terrain) vs Urban, gender, age-class, association, club. For example, I am the 7th best M65 in YHOA at terrain events (though I'm not sure why I'd want to know that).

Where needed, rankings are used for seeding purposes at major events.

[* well, nearly all ...]

[** I won't try to explain how it all works (and not just because I don't know), but I think it's generally agreed that the rankings give a good overall guide but have some anomalies and aren't scientifically precise. And I really like that it's just one list across male and female and all age-classes]

As some examples: at our Temple Newsam day event back in February, points were calculated as follows –

Blue: 1,031.36 + ((97.21 x (4,549.15 - T)) / 1,125.12)

(and similar for Brown, Green and Short Green)

Short Brown: Not enough ranked runners; calculation not possible

Very Short Green: Too many outliers; calculation not possible]
